For decades, our Seward Little League program has provided an enjoyable outdoor sport for Seward & Moose Pass children. Due to the heavy use of the equipment, it must be replaced every few years. The bats currently available to the players are mostly outdated and cheap. Many are cracked, dented, or the handle grips are unraveling. Our coaches have a goal over the next 5 seasons to build our Majors division and add a Seniors division for 13-16 year olds. This team would travel and play competitively with other teams in the Kenai Peninsula & Anchorage areas. The league must follow USA Baseball guidelines to be eligible for this division. Most of the bats we currently have are not approved by the new USA Baseball standards.

Inspiring Girls Expeditions is headquartered in Fairbanks, but we operate our three Alaska expeditions in Seward, Homer, and the Eastern Alaska Range. We are applying for funds to run our Seward expedition, Girls in Icy Fjords. As described below, Girls in Icy Fjords brings both cultural benefit to the Seward community through our partnership with the Alaska SeaLife Center and economic benefit through our support of local businesses.

Inspiring Girls Expeditions believes that everyone deserves opportunities to be curious about the world around them. We empower young women to lead and succeed through science, art, and wilderness exploration.

At Inspiring Girls Expeditions, we aim to increase the participation and diversity of women in the professional worlds of field science, art, and outdoor pursuits. We seek to foster young women's self-confidence in their physical, intellectual, and social abilities while creating lifelong advocates for science and wilderness stewardship. As we build the next generation of women scientists, artists, and guides, we also seek to support a network for current early-career professionals in these fields through continuing development opportunities and collaboration.

We do this because, despite decades of progress, women continue to be underrepresented in historically male-dominated professions like field science and wilderness guiding. At the core of our work are our 12-day tuition-free wilderness science expeditions for high school girls, which introduce girls to these fields and show them they belong. On our expeditions, the girls engage in critical inquiry about the natural world and themselves through science exploration, nightly discussions on broad themes for each day, and practice in art and leadership. The girls ultimately design and conduct their own research projects and present their findings in a public presentation at the end of the expedition. The team is physically challenged through learning about wilderness skills that make field science possible. We offer our expeditions tuition-free specifically towards our goal of increasing the participation and diversity of young women in field science and outdoor pursuits. Doing so removes the often prohibitive cost barrier that many girls face in entering these fields, particularly those from groups that are underrepresented in field science and outdoor recreation. In 20 years, our expeditions have changed the lives of over 400 girls and women.

Inspiring Girls Expeditions began as Girls on Ice in 1999, when founder and director Erin Pettit led a team of five girls up to the South Cascade Glacier with one other instructor in the North Cascades mountains of Washington State. In 2009, Dr. Pettit accepted a faculty position as a glaciologist at the University of Alaska Fairbanks (UAF), and continued to run Girls on Ice Cascades from the university. Three of Dr. Pettit's graduate

students founded Girls on Ice Alaska on the Gulkana Glacier in 2012, and the program continued to grow. We became Inspiring Girls Expeditions in 2016 to reflect our growing capacity to serve high school girls in a variety of wilderness environments, including the Rocky Mountains of Colorado and the marine environments of Southcentral Alaska. We continue to operate Girls on Ice Alaska from UAF, and in 2019 will also operate Girls in Icy Fjords (Seward, AK) and Girls on Water (Homer, AK), both sea kayaking expeditions.

We continue to provide support and mentorship to our alumni after the expedition has ended and they return to their everyday lives. Research has demonstrated that the lack of female-identifying role models and peer support and collaboration are big factors in why women choose to leave STEM fields. We role model the capabilities of women in these professions on the expedition, and mentor our alumni as they apply for college, choose majors, and begin their careers. Several of our alumni have returned to work for Inspiring Girls as interns, coordinators, and instructors.

The same supportive network we offer for our alumni benefits our instructors and larger community of early-career professional women involved in running our expeditions. Our formal training and workshop opportunities help instructors prepare to be effective leaders, role models, and teachers on the expeditions. Our growing community enables women from across the Alaska, the United States, and the world to meet, collaborate, and act as peer mentors.

Though our capacity to serve girls directly through our expeditions is limited, we have a far reaching influence that is disproportionate to our small program size. We have an annual average of 2,000 applicants for our expeditions, which includes applicants from all over the world. We regularly hear from girls or their parents that the application process alone has inspired them to look for new ways to explore the world. Stories from our work are met with excitement and an eagerness to be involved from women scientists, artists, and guides, and we are continually seeking avenues to expand and deepen our impact across these communities.

Project/Program Description*

In 2017, we ran our first sea kayaking science expedition from Seward at Bear Glacier, in partnership with the Alaska Sealife Center (ASLC). The expedition shared the beauty and science of Seward's natural environment with girls from as close as Anchorage to as far away as upstate New York, rural Georgia, and even Jharkhand, India. This team of girls swam in Resurrection Bay, kayaked among seals in Bear Glacier Lagoon, and measured the ice melting from icebergs by listening to their acoustic emissions. They connected with the Seward community directly before and after the expedition through time spent at the ASLC, giving public presentations, hiking the trails, and showing their wide-eyed excitement and inspiration to locals and tourists alike.

We assemble a team of girls from wide ranging backgrounds, offering girls exposure to a peer group with diverse social, economic, and ethnic origins. The value is evident as you see a girl, adopted from Ethiopia and steeped in social justice, interact with a girl from rural India, where girls are often subject to arranged marriages before they turn 14. Or to watch an Inupiaq girl share her knowledge of the spawning salmon splashing around in the stream with an African American girl from New Jersey who has never seen a salmon before. Together, instructors and participants alike gain valuable insights to the wide world beyond our immediate circles, building awareness, empathy, and support for each individual's circumstances and trajectories. Together, we find joy and wonder in exploring the glaciated landscape, collecting 'ice berries' and piling them in the cockpits of our kayaks to place in our drinking water.

In 2019, we want to continue to share the Seward landscape and strengthen our connections with the Seward community engagement with a new team of nine girls from all over the US and beyond. The instructor team is made up of a sea kayaking guide and artist, two glaciologists, an oceanographer, and a wildlife biologist who is a staff member at the ASLC. We will again partner with the ASLC to provide a venue for our public presentations and a space to wrap up and reflect on the myriad experiences of the expedition.

The expedition, which will run from July 16-27, 2019, is structured to provide the girls with the tools and skills to explore the connections between glaciers and the ocean through sea kayaking. The first two days are spent in Seward, learning about sea kayaking gear and developing basic kayaking skills, and hiking the local trails. As much as possible, we try to provide female role models in all professional fields that the girls interact with, from all staff levels at the ASLC, to local research scientists, as well as in our own roles as instructors. We will bring on local women 'visiting scientists' to share their field work and perspectives with the girls.

We then water taxi to Bear Glacier to spend seven days in the backcountry, exploring the glacier and surrounding marine environment. During this time, science and art lessons will engage the girls with their surrounds and develop their scientific observational skills. The goal of these lessons is to provide scaffolding in which they can expand upon information they gather through their own observations about and connections to their environment. Our 2017 team used their journals to map the dynamic waters at the mouth of Bear Glacier Lagoon, focusing attention to shifting currents and mixing patterns. Direct observations such as these inspire team research science projects in which the girls come up with methods of answering questions through data collection and analysis. Through this process, they learn innovative ways to problem solve and overcome the challenges of field science.

During the entire expedition, camping responsibilities rotate amongst the participants to give them ownership of various aspects of the expedition while building leadership skills. The backcountry portion of the expedition finishes with a challenging physical experience that involves an extended sea kayak journey. This experience challenges the girls mentally and physically and gives them the opportunity to test their limits and newly acquired skills in a supportive environment. In 2017, we exited the lagoon and completed the paddle back to Seward under our own power. The sense of accomplishment was palatable as the team landed at Lowell Point and proceeded to dive into the sea in their drysuits, jumping, splashing, and singing with joy, literally immersed in the fjord landscape.

Upon returning from the backcountry, the girls spend two days finishing data analysis from their research projects, preparing public presentations and wrapping up reflections about the experience. The partnership with the ASLC allows us to use space in their facilities to for the last portion of the program. The program culminates in a series of public presentations on the science projects that girls conducted in the field.

Inspiring Girls Expeditions seeks to:

- Increase the participation and diversity of young women in field science and outdoor pursuits. We select a diverse team of participants for the program and show them through our expedition model that they belong in field science, art, and outdoor pursuits, and give them the tools, mentorship, and network of support to pursue their passions as they enter their early careers.

- Foster young women's self confidence in their physical, intellectual, and social abilities while creating lifelong advocates for Earth science and wilderness stewardship. Our expedition model gives the participants ownership in the knowledge and skills they build, and creates a space to gain self confidence in these areas.

- Support a network for early-career women professionals in field science, art, and wilderness guiding through continuing development opportunities and collaboration.

Each of our expeditions works toward our organization-wide goals in unique ways. Girls in Icy Fjords has several program-specific goals:

- Create a diverse team of girls from Alaska and the rest of the United States who hold a variety of identities, backgrounds, and interests.

- Mentor the team in small groups to design, plan, conduct, and synthesize a research project in Bear Glacier Lagoon.

- Build sea kayaking skills necessary to complete a kayak journey from Bear Glacier Lagoon to Seward.

- Deepen our partnership with the Alaska SeaLife Center and other local organizations and community members to continue to build our relationship with the Seward community. We are currently seeking support from the National Science Foundation and the National Ocean and Atmospheric Administration for four more years of support to continue our connection in Seward.

Girls in Icy Fjords 2019 program outcomes include:

- In small groups, team members will synthesize their experiences through a presentation given to the public at the end of the expedition.

- Girls will demonstrate understanding of glacial and marine environments, including the interaction of these two environments in locations like Bear Glacier Lagoon.

- Girls will understand the scientific process and will use it to design a science project, collect and analyze data, and interpret their results in a field setting.

- Girls will complete a sea kayaking objective designed to challenge their physical and mental capabilities.

- Girls will transfer and apply methods of scientific and artistic observation and inquiry to their home lives after the expedition is over.

Project/Program Benefits*

It is our hope to reach as large of an audience as possible, especially young women of the Seward area. We plan to reach out to local schools and youth programs to encourage attendance, with the hope that the program may provide motivation for young women to pursue their dreams, and for all community members to take action where they hold sway.

The public presentation at the end of each expedition serves the local community with insights into the Inspiring Girls experience, personal stories from the girls, and the results of their scientific inquiry and artistic impressions. These presentations have a broad and poignant impact on the local community by familiarizing the audience with the mission of the organization and inspiration for action, as well as the fascinating scientific inquiries that resulted from the experience. The participants gain experience in presenting and interfacing with the public on their scientific studies. In 2017 we witnessed a burgeoning of self confidence from some of our participants with shy or introverted personalities. Provided with a peer support group, they rose to the challenge of public presentation and professionalism.

Utilizing the town of Seward, the Alaska SeaLife Center, and the support from the local community provides mutual benefit to all parties involved. Expanding Inspiring Girls' capacity to operate from Seward allows us to serve more girls on our expeditions each year, many of whom come from all over Alaska. Our expeditions create opportunities for our participants to interact and collaborate with local communities through their public scientific presentations, which, for Girls in Icy Fjords, will be hosted at the Alaska SeaLife Center. The participants' science projects explore ocean acidification and the role of climate change-induced glacial melt, topics that impact Seward and the Resurrection Bay landscape. In 2017, we documented shorebird activity, glacial ice melt, and tidal fresh water/salt water interactions in this otherwise difficult to access location. Looking to the future, the long-term monitoring and inquiry in this rapidly changing environment could prove highly valuable to the scientific community, the Kenai Fjords National Park, and ecotourism and wilderness management.

Overall, our goal to increase the participation and diversity of women in science and outdoor pursuits ultimately aims to strengthen these communities. Research consistently demonstrates how increasing the diversity of people in a community leads to an increase in the diversity of ideas and creative solutions to any given problem. Our expedition model shows girls that they do belong in field science, art, and outdoor pursuits, and gives them the tools, mentorship, and network of support to pursue their passions as they enter their early careers. These expeditions simultaneously provide critical professional development and collaboration opportunities for early career women scientists and artists, who plan and lead the expeditions with professional wilderness guides.

Girls in Icy Fjords benefits the girls and instructors alike. The girls are exposed to new career opportunities and skills like leadership, communication, and self-care in a new environment. They teach and learn from one another in a mutually supportive environment, and when they return home after the expedition, they go with a newly formed network of mentors and peers. Among the benefits to instructors are the ability to engage in professional development and collaboration with peers in their fields, the opportunity to learn from each other and from the girls, and the chance to practice lifelong skills in planning and carrying out complex projects.

A successful Girls in Icy Fjords 2019 expedition will include nine participants from across the United States and five instructors with expertise in a variety of scientific and artistic disciplines.

Our outcomes, also listed above in the Program Goals section, include:

In small groups, team members will synthesize their experiences through a presentation given to the public at the end of the expedition.

Girls will demonstrate understanding of glacial and marine environments, including the interaction of these two environments in locations like Bear Glacier Lagoon.

Girls will understand the scientific process and will use it to design a science project, collect and analyze data, and interpret their results in a field setting.

Girls will complete a sea kayaking objective designed to challenge their physical and mental capabilities. Girls will transfer and apply methods of scientific and artistic observation and inquiry to their home lives

after the expedition is over.

All participants are asked to complete a post-expedition survey to measure and track the outcomes above. Together with post-expedition surveys from our other 2019 programs, this survey data will be used to compile an annual report in the fall of 2019.

After the expedition is completed, the expedition instructors and the larger Inspiring Girls community continue to provide support and mentorship to our alumni. The instructor team will complete a debrief of the expedition and will use survey data from the participants to make adjustments and improvements to the expedition in 2020 and beyond.

We plan to operate Girls in Icy Fjords again in 2020 and in subsequent years, pending funding. We are currently seeking longer-term sources of funding for future years to help ensure that Girls in Icy Fjords can continue to inspire young women in science, art, and wilderness for years to come.

- Services: funds to pay for contractual services including renting vehicles to transport participants from Anchorage to Seward and back and accident insurance for our participants while they are in the field.

The Community of Seward, surrounded by public land managed by a variety of agencies, is a major vector and source of several non-native plant species. Invasive species such as Bird Vetch, White Sweetclover, and Orange Hawkweed have inundated the City of Seward. Some of these species made their way into Seward by being planted in ornamental gardens and others have come via visitors from Anchorage, other parts of Alaska, and the lower 48. In order to prevent these infestations from spreading outside of Seward, a variety of control efforts must be made.

A Community Weed Pull event would give Seward residents the opportunity to engage in the active management taking place throughout the Kenai Peninsula to control the establishment and spread of nonnative plant species. Not only will their participation in the event help to control weed infestations throughout Seward, but they will also have the opportunity to learn about what efforts are being made by the Kenai Peninsula Cooperative Weed Management Area (KP-CWMA) Partnership and why the partnership exists. Volunteers/participants will learn about what they can do in the future to prevent the transportation of invasive species, and how to identify and report new infestations. Pride events nationwide are a time to take a positive stance against discrimination and violence towards the LGBT+ community. It is a time to celebrate and support our LGBT+ community members, families, and allies. This event in Seward will be a way to show our community that we are supportive, safe space for both our LGBT+ community members but also visitors to Seward. We will be hosting a 3-day celebration with various events throughout.

The Seward Pride celebration will kick off Friday, June 14th with a welcoming bonfire currently cosponsored by Marathon Helicopters. The bonfire will include free smores, information about SPA, and music.

Saturday, June 15th will include a ranger lead hike at Exit Glacier for limited numbers in the morning, a family friendly BBQ with games, and a DJ dance party at Seward Alehouse (21+ event).

We will use this contact information to send out a survey to gather information on the perceived success of the event from the consumer standpoint. Additionally we will send surveys to donors and sponsors to measure their level of perceived success. We will be seeking donations at every event and can report on the amount of donations gained during events as well as monetary value of goods and services donated to events. Our sponsors will be recognized and surveyed so their continued support for future events including Pride annually is a measurement of success. Lastly, we hope to work with the Seward Prevention Coalition in the future to get questions on the community needs assessment about our organization and services that should be offered. This will allow us to determine if the event created community awareness of our organization.
