# "A Note from our Chairman"

What a good year 2024 has turned out to be. Thanks to the generosity of the Seward and Moose Pass donors, the Seward Community Foundation (SCF) has given out over \$106,000 in grants to our local nonprofits.



Some of these funds were given to the Seward Prevention Coalition to assist the Homeless Connection; Seward Mural Society for the new Jon Van Zyle Iditarod mural; Sustainable Seward to assist with electronics recycling; Resurrection Bay Historical Society for the Lydia Jacoby exhibit at the Seward Museum (if you haven't seen it, check it out); the Seward Arts Council to support Artists in School; Kenai Mountains-Turnagain Arm National Heritage Area to provide a local-hire teacher for outdoor education for Seward & Moose Pass students.

This adds up to over 1.3 million dollars that the Seward Community Foundation has distributed to our Seward & Moose Pass nonprofits. This proves the caring and generous nature of our community. Your contributions help all the nonprofits in Seward and Moose Pass by offering the financial support they need to meet their mission. The Business Partnership Program has continued to grow and has contributed over \$5,000 so far this year & over \$30,000 since its inception. The Pie Social drew 100-125 people and the three winners of best pie donated their grants to the Seward Arts Council, Youth 360 and the Boys & Girls Club. We're closing in on our \$20,000 match from Rasmuson Foundation and with your help we will get there.

Please consider the Seward Community Foundation in your end-of-year giving. After all, it is your gifts that make all of this possible. Remember the nonprofits and volunteers that give so much to our community. This holiday season please drive carefully but donate recklessly. ## Three Organizations- Three Missions- One Umbrella

In this newsletter, the Seward Community Foundation is pleased to highlight three grant recipients from recent years. The unique missions of these organizations illustrate the diversity of the good works being done in our community.

#### Ice Cleats for the Kiddos

In 2023, Sprouts Preschool requested a mini-grant of \$480 to purchase ice cleats for their students. Winter conditions are never easy in Seward. It's doubly difficult when trying to take 3-5 year olds outside for fresh air and exercise. Teacher Tara Craytor states that trying to safely navigate 20 preschoolers across ice to their destination was... well, not easy at best. But this changed when cleats were purchased using SCF funding. She reports, "The ice cleats were amazing last winter and will be amazing again this winter.... We have an all outdoor learning day every Wednesday and the cleats have helped us expand our classroom."

## Electronic Recycling

annual recycling events for electronic related items. Through the years SCF has been one of many fiscal supporters of this effort. In 2024, a \$1,000 mini grant was awarded to assist in this yearly event.

Lori Landstrom reported that the event continues to be successful throughout their seven year history. This year a total of 6,162 pounds of cords, antiquated electronics, games, etc were deposited. Throughout the years this brings a total of 42,067 pounds (that would be over 21 tons) of garbage kept out of the dump. When asked, Lori said her favorite items turned in for recycling were a hamburger phone and a vintage light saber.

### **Homeless Connection**

This year the Seward Community Foundation awarded a \$7500 major grant to the Seward Homeless Connection for Individual Assistance and Free Showers. Unfortunately Seward is not immune to the concern of growing homelessness. According to recent surveys our community will have between 10 to 20 un-housed families this year. The Homeless Connection has been working since 2018 to address the issue of housing instability and basic living needs. The issues are addressed simultaneously since many who are not currently homeless can suddenly lose stability when an unexpected expense arrives.

The most common requests for assistance are for heating costs in the winter, payment of overdue rent to prevent eviction, or payment of overdue utility debts to prevent utility turn-off. Clients are screened to determine need and assistance is usually limited to \$250. Payments are made directly to the creditor.

This targeted financial assistance and shower tokens program is a partnership of several organizations including Seward Community Library, He Will Provide Food Bank, Seward Community Health Center, Seward Senior Center, Qutekcak Native Tribe, SeaView Community Services, and the Seward Harbormaster.

These organizations recognize that the well-being and dignity of all individuals is critical to the health of a community.

## Fiscal Sponsorship

Although these organizations and their projects seem quite diverse, they do share one commonality. All were funded under the umbrella of the Seward Prevention Coalition (SPC).

Not all of the organizations doing good works in our area have the required 501(c) (3) designation to qualify for funding. The filing process can be both daunting and costly. However, it is not uncommon to have organizations request funds under the umbrella of an established organization with that designation. This is called a fiscal sponsorship.

SPC is a 501 (c) (3) that offers fiscal sponsorship to organizations that align with their mission of addressing the overall health and wellbeing of our communities. Katie Cornwell (Executive Director of SPC) states that one of the primary goals of SPC becoming their own 501 (c) (3) was to be able to act as the fiscal agent for smaller groups and organizations in Moose Pass and Seward without that designation. Katie is quick to point out that they also help mentor projects, connect people to resources, and provide guidance on how to successfully achieve organization's goals.

Seward Community Foundation is proud to be part of the network of people and organizations that make the Seward and Moose Pass communities vibrant and healthy.

## A New Era of Collaboration with the Business Partner Program

The program has raised over \$30,000 so far for our endowed funds!
